Jessica Kennedy is an award-winning choreographer and dance artist based in Dublin. She is co-founder and Co-Artistic Director of Junk Ensemble, a multi-award winning & leading Irish dance-theatre company. Jessica trained in the United States, Dublin and London, completing a Bachelors Degree in Dance Performance & English Literature at Middlesex University London and a Photography Diploma at Dun Laoghaire College of Art & Design. She has performed extensively with dance and theatre companies throughout Europe and the UK including Blast Theory (UK), Retina Dance Company (UK), Tanz Lange (Germany), Firefly Productions (Belgium.) In Ireland she has collaborated regularly with Brokentalkers and has performed in and choreographed for numerous short and feature films (dir Oonagh Kearney; Alice Maher; Robert Manson; Antonia Campbell-Hughes) and opera work. She was awarded Best Female Performer for Dublin Fringe Festival 2006. Jessica co-created the internationally acclaimed short film Motion Sickness (2012) which has screened across thirty festivals worldwide and has worked regularly in Scotland as a movement director for productions with The Tron (Glasgow/Beijing) & Theatre Gu Leor. She is part of an all-female experimental electronica group 'Everything Shook'.



Walé Adebusuyi is a singer/songwriter, actor and dancer. Born in London, the family moved to Ireland when Walé was an infant. Initially residing in Ballymun for some time before finally settling in the leafy Dublin suburb of Raheny

His career as a performer started in his local gospel church where he was personally guided and tutored by the renowned musical director Oto Laleye, best known for his remarkable career as one of the original cornerstones of legendary Afrobeat creator Fela Kuti's ensemble.

It was at St. Paul's secondary school in Raheny where Walé's theatre journey began. He took centre stage in the school's musical production, Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody". Walé is a regular guest performer for many artists and performers. Featuring on numerous tracks for artists such as Tolu Makay, Malaki and the funk group that is the "X collective" made up of numerous of Ireland's most talented musicians. Walé currently resides in Dublin's Clontarf where he is working on his debut album. He is also working as executive producer on a short biopic about his life. The film was commissioned this year with shooting having started and a release date expected in 2023



Robyn Byrne is a contemporary dancer and emerging choreographer working across theatre, film & dance. Her film O before I has been screened nationally and internationally, most notably being Leeds International Film Festival 2021. Her most recent work Glimmer in collaboration with Rachel Ní Bhraonáin was presented as part of Live Collision International Festival 2022. Robyn is currently researching a new show Queen of the Meadows which had a work in progress sharing at Dublin Dance Festival's Originate Programme this year. To support this work, Robyn is this year's National Dance Residency Partnership artist. Through the six major contemporary dance organisations across Ireland. Lucia Kickham is a Wexford based dance artist performing and collaborating internationally since 2011.
